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CRIME PREVENTION MEETING A BIG SUCCESS

A big thank you to Captain Kelly of the 5th District and Officer Jones of the 8th District for speaking at our Crime Prevention Meeting held March 3. An enthusiastic crowd listened to how the NOPD is adapting to our needs in the fight to reduce crime. Of particular note was the change in policy to increase foot and horse patrols in our neighborhood.

Also in attendance were Councilman Carter and his community relations liaison, Mary Cunningham, and the Guardian Angels who reported on crime reductions effort at the City and neighborhood level.

At the meeting we also unveiled several programs from our January brain storming session and one program from the City to help us reduce crime in our neighborhood. They are:

WHISTLE ALERT: *Eyes on the Street*

This program is to help citizens alert one another if a crime is happening so that we respond quickly, and hopefully deter criminals from committing crimes. Residents should carry a whistle when they are out on the street and blow it if they feel they are in danger to alert people and draw attention to the area. Should someone hear or see someone blowing a whistle, they should call the police immediately and report the location. This is like when one smells smoke, they rush to check what is burning and call the fire department immediately. Every second counts.

The FMIA is providing whistles at cost. If interested in purchasing whistles, please email us.

LIGHT THE MARIGNY FOR SAFETY

This program is to help keep the Marigny well lit so citizens can walk the streets safely. Residents should keep their outdoor lights on at night for safety. This helps people walking. It illuminates their surroundings and minimizes shadows and hiding places.

Installing photo sensors will automatically turn lights on at dusk and off at dawn. To further reduce cost, many fixtures can be fitted with long-lasting, energy-saving bulbs. United Hardware is providing photocells at cost to us for this program. **(Thank you, United Hardware!)** We also help people install them. To be included in this program, please email us.

MEET THE NEIGHBORS

To welcome residents new to the Marigny, and support neighborhood businesses, we gather monthly as friends

BLOCK CAPTAINS

Information saves lives. And quick dissemination of information is critical in preventing crime. We are seeking volunteers from each block to participate in our block captain system. Block Captains would share important crime information with their immediate neighbors. To participate in the system, please email us with your name, number and the block you would like to serve as captain.

GOOD NEIGHBOR PROGRAM

The Broken Window Theory states that a single broken window can invite crime into a neighborhood by showcasing to criminals that the property is not taken care of and most likely vacant and that people in the neighborhood are not active enough to put pressure on the home owner to keep up their property. The property may also be used to harbor criminals, drugs and stolen goods.

The City of New Orleans has created the Good Neighbor Program so that residents can report blighted and/or vacant property. If you know of a blighted home (broken doors, windows, etc.) visit the city's web site at www.cityofno.com.

We also began a discussion on more long-term strategies. They are: **Security Crime Patrol, Citizen Crime Patrol** and **Cameras on Street Corners**. After the discussion we asked participants to fill out a quick survey to prioritize strategies to pursue. You can fill out the survey online on our web site.

The meeting ended with more discussion and suggestions, including the recommendation for the creation of a crime prevention committee. Kerrie Ramsdell stepped up to the task and is now our Crime Prevention Chair. **(Thank you Kerrie!)** The purpose of this committee is to promote current programs, investigate and research long-term strategies and come up with new programs to reduce crime. 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REPORT FROM LAST PUBLIC INPUT MEETING

The City Planning Commission heard the last public input on the UNOP City Wide plan on March 7 at 5pm. The meeting was packed with the number of speakers approaching 40 by 8pm.

Overall, there was no call to scuttle the process and begin again. However, much of the commentary reflected the Bureau of Governmental Research's (BGR) concerns about the plan's lack of consistency and outright contradiction, vagueness, and failure to realistically prioritize projects.

Footprint issues (such as how to evaluate opportunities and challenges in rebuilding specific neighborhoods; and the failure of the plan to clarify fund allocation methods: whether community need or community population density will be used) were discussed; as well as the need for timelines in plan implementation.

The newly-formed Planning Districts Leadership Coalition, a group of neighborhood organizations and concerned citizens dedicated to pushing this process forward, was well represented. Many speakers called for instituting and maintaining a process/structure for ongoing citizen participation to provide support, guide rebuilding and address the problems of the loss of momentum and burnout etc. among participants. Many wanted to know how, and especially when, the district and neighborhood plans would be open for public comment. The need for a Master Plan with the force of law was called for often.

The City Planning Commission got the message that citizen participation in city planning is an important and necessary part of the rebuilding process.

The Planning Districts Leadership Coalition is meeting to discuss the next steps on March 13 at 8am at the Chateau Sonesta Hotel (800 Iberville St.) in meeting room D.H. Holmes B. Breakfast is served for \$6 a person. Please bring cash or a check.

The City Planning Commission has scheduled a meeting on March 13, 3:30pm in City Council Chambers to hear public comment on the neighborhood plans, including the Lambert and ACORN plans.




PLAYGROUND FUNDRAISING

Highlights of the NONPAC, 8th District Meeting March 8, 2007

A large crowd attended the NONPAC 8th District Meeting on March 8, 2007 and expressed the importance of solving the crime problem in the French Quarter and Marigny Triangle.

E-Mail Program — After numerous complaints from citizens at the meeting about the lack of information on recent crimes in the 8th District, Capt. Ed Hosli, commander of the district which polices the Quarter and Triangle, announced an e-mail program will be set up in the next couple of weeks to alert residents to crimes in their neighborhoods. The information -- transmitted from this email address -- will include the type of crime, where it occurred, when, the MO ("modus operandi" = the way it occurred). "I want to avoid the rumor mill," said Hosli, who came from the Uptown's 2nd District, and was amazed at how fast information -- whether accurate or not -- travels through the Quarter. The email program received the enthusiastic approval of the captain's boss, Chief of Operations Tony Cannatella. The 8th District will be the only NOPD district doing this in the city.

Auto thefts — Hosli reported a rash of auto thefts in the district in the past month, but noted many of the cars had been towed not stolen. He is going to set up a log at the district headquarters to keep track of the time of the tow and the location of the towed vehicle so it can be checked before reporting the vehicle stolen.

Scoters — Captain Hosli was asked about use of the bicycles donated by the FMIA. At this time, Hosli wants the officers to use the scooters located at the 8th District Headquarters. The officers will be in training classes for the scooters this month.


More Patrols — The Criminal Sheriff's Department will begin mounted horse patrols in the Lower Quarter beginning next week. Patrols will also be expanded to the Marigny Triangle. Thirty Louisiana State Troopers are assisting the 8th District during patrols.

Reporting crime — Hosli urged citizens to report crime to 911 as soon as it happens. And for suspicious situations -- "something doesn't look right" -- he urged contacting the district directly (658-6080 or him personally by email at EHosli@cityofno.com). "I firmly believe if we address the little things it'll take care of the big things," he said.

Councilperson Carter spoke about a Criminal Tracking Program to guard against crime. It is planned for real-time access through n opd8.com. He also spoke about plans for a Court Watcher's Program, where you may track the crime process from inception to conviction through the criminal justice system.



A process that is without public input unless you consider sitting in a meeting listening to ideas from people that have no idea what New Orleans is about a public input process. Well, to be fair, the architects did get a gift bag of New Orleans "things" to play with, so if you believe in osmosis they can be considered New Orleanians just like I am a New Yorker because I have a statue of the Empire State Building.

Again, we are faced with a process similar to the Sanitation Departments' fiasco with the new trashcans, which if they included the public in the discussion, we would have been able to inform them of the problems and solved them before the plan went into action.

We are asking people to either adopt a tree by donating the money to pay for the yearly buck moth spraying and fertilizing or make a donation towards the spraying and fertilization of a tree.

The cost is \$55 per tree, \$30 for half a tree or whatever donation you would like to give.

If you have outdoor house light we ask that you to keep it on at night for safety. This is to help people who are walking on the street to clearly see their surroundings and to make sure no one is lurking in the shadows. You can equip your out door lights with a photocell that will automatically turn on the light on at dusk and turn it off at dawn and to reduce the cost many fixtures can be fitted with long lasting, energy saving light bulbs. 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
